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MINUTES

Executive Committee
Pacific Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends
March 2, 1974 - - - Meeting in San Francisco, California

The meeting opened with a period of silent worship at 9:45 A.M.

The Agenda was approved.

Treasurer's Report. Robert Young.

North Pacific Yearly Meeting has expressed interest in and financial support of the Bulletin. Funds have been distributed to NPYM with ease and in mutual cooperation.

Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Pima, and Flagstaff were queried with a proposal "similar to that for NPYM" for distribution of funds. Albuquerque and Pima have responded that no division is requested: "PYM should use the money in accordance with need and usefulness."

We have so far transferred \$2600 of an expected \$7300 to be transferred. We have \$5660 remaining in general funds. The full report and budget are appended to these Minutes.

In response to questions, stipends are not listed in the Statement--many figures here are net. We have details in the books on YM ins and outs. Committees are requested to put in their budget requests. "One-percent-more" funds from the Meetings should go through PYM books.

Nominating Committee. Barbara Perry.

1974.ExC.1. The following proposal for restructuring the Bulletin Committee was approved in substance, and referred again to the Nominating Committee to propose how and from where Bulletin Committee nominees shall be selected, and to bring in a list of names when they are ready again:

1) The Bulletin Committee shall consist of nine members; six from the geographic areas served and three from the immediate area of the editor.

2) The Committee shall make policy and solve problems as specified in Faith and Practice.

3) Members shall be Friends, active in Meetings, able to encourage contributions, themselves to serve as correspondents and contributors.

4) Terms shall be three years, overlapping, with three appointments per year.

5) The three members in close proximity to the Editor will in addition serve as working members to assist the Editor in production of the Bulletin.

A copy of this proposal has been sent to Alice Dart, Clerk of NPYM steering committee; it is envisioned that NPYM each year appoint one member of the Committee, who will correspond and refer material.

The Nominating Committee asks for guidance on the Friends Schools Committee. According to Faith and Practice it has consultative status. Mary Jorgensen will consult with Charles Croninger.

Because we travel too much and read and write too little, and because there are already three representatives from FGL's to FCNL, and because we couldn't get the FCNL representative to come here, we agreed to:

- 1974. ExC. 2. Wait for a report from the present FCNL representative, and refer to Nominating Committee its recommendation for two representative with two-year overlapping terms.
- 1974. ExC. 3. We will have two (2) Recording Clerks for PYM, beginning this year, 1974. Each will record alternate sessions.
- 1974. ExC. 4. Anna James was approved as PYM representative to Friends World Committee to replace Margaret Jump, who resigned.
- 1974. ExC. 5. Pat Brown will be asked to clerk the Committee on Junior Yearly Meeting.
- 1974. ExC. 6. The Historian-Archivist will serve ex officio on the Discipline Committee.

Ministry and Oversight. Asenath Young.

Palomar and San Diego, new Monthly Meetings, have been recognized by Southern California Quarterly Meeting and are welcomed into PYM. This welcome will be extended at a plenary session of PYM and the new meetings will be reported to Friends World Committee.

Lois Bailey, clerk of the Visitation Committee, reported that John Ullman has visited Phoenix, and Larry Jackson Honolulu. Whole meetings have visited other meetings for a weekend, particularly in College Park Quarter.

The Committee on Worship Fellowship Groups emphasizes their importance to the deepening of worship at PYM, and requests more silence, even to the subsequent walk to General Session.

The sub-committee on Homosexuality has produced a paper which is now in the hands of Ministry and Oversight, and may be ready for publication by the time of Yearly Meeting.

- 1974.ExC. 7. Ministry and Oversight has produced a paper, "At Time of Death", which is now ready for publication. After some discussion, it was agreed that PYM will underwrite the publication of "At Time of Death", printing of which will cost ca. \$600 for 1000 copies in a format similar to Faith and Practice. This is not a precedent for further publications. M & O is encouraged to continue readying the paper on homosexuality and may investigate Pendle Hill and other avenues for possible publication of that and other papers. There is a moratorium on further PYM publications until the general session has had an opportunity to discuss a PYM publication policy.

After expression of some reservations about the recognition of closed groups before, during and after lunch, we recessed at 12:10 pm, discussed earnestly and enjoyed the food provided by San Francisco Meeting, reassembled at 1:45 and at 2 pm approved:

- 1974. ExC. 8. Creation of sharing groups which are open (only) to those to whom they are addressed. This is a new departure for us, it will require education in Yearly Meeting by M & O and by all of this committee as it has required education of us, and M & O and YM will evaluate what is now a recognized part of our life in Yearly Meeting.

1974. ExC. 9. Executive Committee was unable to approve endorsement of the Theology Conference to be held at John Woolman School in summer of 1974 or M & O's request for up to \$350 for resource leadership.
1974. ExC. 10. Approved \$100 more for the budget of Min. & Oversight Committee.
1974. ExC. 11. Disapproved hosting Friends General Conference on West Coast at this time.

M & O asked Executive Committee for permission to place the item, Nude Swimming, on the agenda of a plenary session at YM. After extensive discussion, in which it was averred that M & O should not have raised the issue with ExCom; a Minute from Berkeley Meeting was presented; John Fitz said that arrangements could easily be made; it was pointed out that now nude swimming could be made the subject of a sharing group; apprehension was expressed over newspaper reaction; two members felt that an immediate turn-down should be given here in ExCom; the decision two years ago was defended and condemned with reference to good order; and William Scott speaking for M & O said that at least five issues are involved, viz.: nudity, liberties and rights, loving concern, St. Mary's, and allegations that the decision was not made correctly, ExCom agreed that:

1974. ExC. 12. Ministry and Oversight should refer the subject of Nude Swimming to the Agenda Review Committee.
1974. ExC. 13. An ad hoc sub-committee of Ministry and Oversight on the issues, concerns, and ministry of women's sharing was established, to be appointed by the Nominating Committee.
1974. ExC. 14. Room and board for Robert and Margaret Blood as resource persons at FYM was approved, although it was pointed out that this is pointing in the direction of subsidizing leaders.

Peace Committee. Earle Reynolds.

There will be a peace studies convocation this summer, probably at John Woolman School, of 3 or 4 days, mostly for high school teachers, carrying extension credit from UC Santa Cruz.

World Disarmament week, sponsored by FWCC, will be held April 22-28.

Apropos the letter on President Nixon sent out by California Yearly Meeting, ExCom approved the following Minute adapted from the Marin Meeting's Minute of January 13, 1974, for sending over the Clerk's signature to our Congressmen and to the House Judiciary Committee:

- 1974 ExC. 15. The Executive Committee of Pacific Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends urges that the House of Representatives immediately initiate impeachment proceedings against President Nixon, which will not prejudice his guilt, but will allow a fair and full trial by the Senate. For the sake of the people, our system of government, and for the Presidency itself, the myriad charges which have arisen must be fully and legally resolved in the light of truth.

Social Order Committee. Jean Flores.

Jean was unavoidably absent due to her mother's recent death; Social Order concerns were put over to Yearly Meeting.

Friends in the Orient. Stuart Innerst.

When our controversy shifts from the Peace Committee to the Ministry and Oversight report. Stuart wonders if we are turning to the interior.

The Committee has decided to invite Marjorie Sykes, a citizen of India. to come here this fall, instead of our sending a representative to the Orient this year. It was pointed out that we have two Friends in the Orient from Eugene Meeting: David Anderson, who is teaching nonviolence in Japan, and Lois Barton, who is in Korea.

Schools Committee. Charles Croninger.

The Committee was reorganized at last YM to include representatives from Pacific Ackworth and John Woolman Schools and members at large. It has two meetings per year of which the first has been held and the second will be this spring at JWS. It will promote summer activities directly related to Friends. It suggests sponsoring a hiking trip for Junior High people during Yearly Meeting.

College Park Quarterly Meeting Report. Mary Jorgensen, Clerk.

At the Fall meeting 250 braved the wilds of Ben Lomond and considered John Woolman School's serious problems. The Winter meeting at Berkeley squeezed business around the edges of a study of Howard Brinton's Quaker Practice, led by Pegge Lacey. The Quarter decided against recommending a Brinton memorial lectureship; some thought better of subsidizing a resource person.

Finance Committee. Lloyd Bailey.

Seasoned budgetary requests were requested from Committees. The Committee was asked to supply guides about use of the Sharing Fund.

Consultative Committee on Organization. Gretchen Tuthill.

The Santa Fe withdrawal will be recognized this year at YM. They are not being asked for support this year. Visitation must be requested; it is not initiated by the Committee.

Education Committee and Educational Programs. Lee Steelman and Marian Sanders.

There will be an interest group this YM on reconciliation between men and women; and a sharing group on parenting. The Committee requests space on the registration forms for interest in a cooperative nursery program, and for signing up to help with the children's program. Men have agreed to provide child care in the evening, freeing women to attend sessions. Also we have men and women teams for leadership of the 6-8 and 9-11 groups. There will be no "trip" this year. Meetings can contribute money or support a teacher at Yearly Meeting.

1974. ExC. 16. The Junior High Hike, suggested by Schools Committee, was referred for exploration by the Education Committee.

Junior Yearly Meeting. Brian Heilman, Clerk.

There will be three interest groups this year: 1. How men and women can be affectionate and remain free and independent. 2. Evangelism and pentecostalism

among Friends, and 3. Death and dying. Junior High people are invited to all meetings. They ask a lounge for each group, to be open 24 hours, a joint camping area with Young Friends, swimming in the evenings, and expect to have a Doctor friend back to talk on sex and the games people play. Officers are Steve Ray, Assistant Clerk; Martine Ernst, Recording Clerk; Sara Cole, Treasurer; Mike Turner, Arrangements; and Jennifer Davis, Junior High Clerk. Donuts will be free and a mile high in the first meeting.

Holding Corporation. Richard Ernst.

The Corporation wants to establish trusts to which people may donate at the request of monthly meetings with provision for life income to the donor. 1974. ExC. 17. This was approved, recommended to YM and to the YM agenda.

Bulletin. Dennis Durby in the absence of Beach Langston.

The Committee has not met since October. Problems are lateness, scarcity of material, addressing mechanics. Beginning February, Pat Brown will be paid to help with details. The Bulletin can now use photographs, and unofficial reports of events are earnestly solicited. Better a flood than a trickle. The following deadlines were listed:

- April (March 10): Women's issues, Visitation of Meetings, Schools Committees
- May (April 10): Registration forms, Discipline Committee Report, Finance Committee, Education Committee, and Arrangements.
- June (May 10): Consultative Committee on Organization, Friend in the Orient, Social Order, Bulletin Committee, Children's Program
- July (June 10): Peace Committee, Tentative Schedule, Ministry and Oversight, Junior Yearly Meeting/Young Friends reportsm Clerk's message.

Agenda Review Committee. Pegge Lacey.

1974. ExC. 18. Approved Agenda Review Committee as a standing ex officio committee consisting of: Assistant Clerk (who clerks this committee), Clerk, Clerks of Ministry and Oversight, Young Friends, and Junior Yearly Meeting.

Registrars. Frank (and Steve) Burnham.

Recommend with the Treasurer that we postpone signing the contract with St. Mary's pending clearer understandings about camping, the remodeling of Justin and Dryden, the theater and the Brick pile. The contract calls for payment of \$11,250 this year; we spent \$10,274 for food last year. We received \$21,231 and refunded \$413. Yearly Meeting cost us net about \$1000.

1974 ExC. 19. Robert Young and Frank Burnham were directed to negotiate the contract further, and then the Clerk may sign, upon their advice.

Frank recommended that costs be held to last year's schedule for individuals and families, with PYM underwriting the 10% or more anticipated increase.

1974. ExC. 20. ExCom approved raising the schedule not more than 10% above last year's schedule. This will make it \$12 per day for dormitory and meals for individuals, \$27.50 for meals only, 5 days.

We recessed for dinner at 5:45, to reconvene at 7:50 p.m.

The Committee saw no reason to segregate Junior Friends by sex by floors, in the dorms (just by rooms.) Berkeley's concern to eliminate the signature of the Clerk from the registration form was considered, and many felt that some communication about problems of attendance at Yearly Meeting is necessary, that this should be done with tact and discretion by someone who knows the meetings, and that the occasion may be used to ascertain financial need. The Clerk's signature has never been intended or (probably) used to approve people for attending.

1974. ExC. 21. "Clerk" will be left on the form, the signature line will be under a short statement prepared by the Clerk of YM and the Registrar signifying what the signature is for, and the forms will be accompanied by a letter explaining that meetings can designate responsible persons other than the clerk to sign. (A young friend took this occasion to make her regular statement which begins, "I am not a member, BUT...")

Arrangements. John Fitz.

John Bird will take care of the pool, and young Draper the sound equipment. We would like suggestions of people in meetings who will serve on the Arrangements Committee. John Fitz will contact them. Monthly meetings may be asked to undertake certain areas of functions. Some assignments remaining are space, transportation, signs, other recreation than pool, equipment, health, communications, displays. Martha Dart may be listed for selection of books. Make your suggestions.

Young Friends. Heather Raitt, Clerk of the Committee.

Replies to the Epistle have been received. YF held a retreat New Years at Ben Lomond, and plan another in the same place on the Easter weekend. Heather cannot assure that YF have any peace concerns.

Interest and Sharing Groups. Shirley Tweed.

The guidelines did not operate last year due to lateness of the Bulletin. (This was not bad, since some very fine, spontaneous interest groups arose and were held.) This year they are modified as follows and approved:

1974. ExC. 22. The Agenda Review Committee will review all and schedule some requests for Interest and Sharing Groups received by the evening of the first day of YM (Tuesday this year.) Any requests received after that time will be called simply "meetings on subjects" and will not be scheduled at interest group and sharing group times; they may be scheduled at any other time. Legitimate requests arise through monthly meetings, committee meetings, meetings at YM including plenary sessions. A form will be prepared which will ask for information as to leadership, scope of subject, equipment needs, etc. Each group will be asked to prepare a half-page summary of Minutes, to be included with YM Minutes, and which may be published in the Bulletin.

Site Committee. Douglas Price (Honolulu Meeting) in lieu of Larry Perry.

We are again cordially invited to Hawaii, where the Meeting has located several suitable sites, made commitments to undertake all necessary jobs and arrangements, and offers us hospitality such as we may have dreamed. However, they are sensitive to the airfare problem (presently \$175 per m, w, c, charter) which might exclude some, and might bind others' concern for simple living. Douglas was warmly thanked.

Directory. Etta Vogel.

New York Yearly Meeting got out a directory with a computer printout of reduced size, readable with a glass. The computer part cost \$40; printing of 1500 copies of such a directory would be about \$1000 if pages were printed on one side, \$1700 using both sides of the paper. (1600 names, members only.) It was suggested that quarterly and monthly meetings might benefit from partial printouts and shoulder a major portion of the cost, but that inclusion of attenders would be mandatory.

1974. ExC. 23. The project, with questions, was referred to the following ad hoc committee: Robert Vogel, Betty Draper, Barbara Perry, and either Frances Woodson or Charles Swift.

Southern California Quarterly Meeting. Charles Swift, Clerk.

The two new meetings, Palomar and San Diego, both of SCQ, were announced again, with a touch of pride. The Quarter has an ad hoc committee to bring YM closer together, particularly Phoenix and Honolulu. Members will probably attend Yearly Meeting in a couple of chartered buses this year. They have adopted a Minute on amnesty.

Nominating Committee Returned . Barbara Perry.

The Women's Subcommittee (see 1974. ExC. 13) will have co-convenors
1974. ExC.24. Billie Hamilton and Sue Brun (if the latter agrees.)

1974. ExC. 25. The Social Order Committee shall consist of 9 members-at-large appointed for 3-year overlapping terms (3 each year.)

Ad hoc Committee to name 3 (now 4) members of the Nominating Committee. Clerk.

Practice has varied during the past 5 years. We approved the following coficidation:

1974. ExC. 26. An ad hoc committee of 4 members one of whom shall be named convenor, shall be named by Executive Committee in March. This committee shall recommend 3 members for the Nominating Committee, and also the Clerk, who shall be one of those serving his/her second year, which recommendations shall be made to Representative Committee no later than its third session at YM. The Representative Committee is to recommend the names which it approves to plenary session of the Yearly Meeting.

1974. ExC. 27. The following names were approved to this ad hoc committee: Peggy Spear, convenor, Sandra Farley, Ellie Foster, Ed Janoe; alternate, in order; John Salyer and Ken Morgan.

Communications and Concerns.

In response to a letter from Peter Uren,
1974. ExC. 28. We will send Ed Sanders as our representative to the Friends General Session of Mexico, September 14, 15 and 16, 1974.

1974 ExC.29. We will send two representatives (in addition to Ferner Nuhn, who will be there anyway) at the cost of one (we will look for one who can pay his/her own way) to the national Faith and Life Conference to be held at Indianapolis Columbus Day weekend. A Young Friend was urged. These will be named by Ministry and Oversight.

The Clerk asked help on arranging a Clerks' Meeting. Southern California will have one May 18 all day led by Ed Sanders. Perhaps College Park Quarter can host one for Nor.Cal. We adjourned sine die at 10:35 p.m.
