MINUTES

1.Present are Representatives from: [Monthly Meetings]Berkeley, Chico, Claremont, Davis, Grass Valley, Honolulu, La Jolla, Los Angeles, Marin, Orange County, Orange Grove, Pacific Ackworth, Redding, Redwood Forest, Sacramento, San Fernando Valley, San Jose, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Strawberry Creek and Whitleaf [Preparative Meeting] Appleseed; [Worship Groups] Conejo Valley and S. County.

2.We are here to enable Yearly Meeting to execute its purposes; we have therefore asked ourselves what we expect from Yearly Meeting: what Yearly meeting is for?

*To create real community among Friends, so that whatever we do or say can be at once informed and effective. It is all right if it is also enjoyable.

*Within the safety of that community, to look again at moral and religious issues. What used to be "right" that we should now notice as wrong? Friends should beware of carrying through ancient (then lively) concerns until they become a present moribund tradition.

*To engage Friends in public issues, to discover God's will for those issues, & to lead Friends genuinely so to influence Society, that changes which we are clear about do actually happen. For such effective engagement, we may need to scrape off, sometimes on the spur of the moment, barnacles of committee ship and structure - which so often detain us from a rapid course to a clear goal. Where we have committees we should trust them; and not always review, but usually just hear, their actions on our behalf.

- 3. The Committee to name the Nominating Committee brings to us the name of Noah Wardrip Fruin, [attender of Orange County Meeting], which name will be brought before us later in the day.
- 4. Nominating Committee.
- (a) The following names are brought forward:

Mark Koenig CH to Clerk the Children's Program Committee to July 1994 Eric Sabelman PA to serve for three years 1994-96 as Co Registrar Clare Galbraith DE to serve for three years 1994-96 on the Peace Committee, Ellie Shacter LJ having resigned

Tom Farley PA to serve on the Wider Fellowship among Friends Committee, to July 1994, Marie Schutz RF having resigned

These names will be brought forward later in the day.

- (b) Bob Barnes GV represented us to the Reunion Generale de Los Amigos
- (c) We appoint Jan Tappan OG Bob Barnes GV and Rolene Otero OG with Janet Leslie CH as an alternate, to attend the Triennial Conference, Carol Mosher BE having resigned.

- (d) We agree that the Treasurer of the Unity With Nature Committee, (the "Earth-Light Treasurer") as an ex-officio member of the Committee, be eligible for travel reimbursement.
- 5. Treasurer's Report. . We gratefully receive the Report attached RC 5-1. In view of experience with lost or non-cashed checks, we agree that the Treasurer, in his or her discretion, may stop payment and deduct the resultant bank fee from any replacement check.
- 6. Arrangements Committee. We receive the Co-Registrar Report giving rates for PYM at Chico 1994 attached hereto RC 6-1.
- 7. Sites Committee. Joan Johnson WW has reported for the Sites Committee; their written report is attached RC 7-1.
- 8. East West Committee. The Committee is pursuing the idea of a Friends' Center in Moscow, and to that end there is now an interim governing Board consisting of 5 Friends to discover which Yearly Meetings would support it and what legal structure should oversee it. We approve of Julie Harlow DA as our Representative on that Board, the other members being Alan Playdell LYM, Greg Lamb NW YM, John Shuffert Philadelphia YM, and John Slater NYYM.
- 9. Finance Committee. Vanita Blum BE (Clerk) has reported for the Committee. Moscow Center: we agree that \$700 should be given to the East West committee for the development of the Friends' Center in Moscow, which sum should be reviewed each year.

 Bookstore: we agree to add \$250 to our subsidy budget for the AFSC bookstore East West Committee: Travel. We agree to add \$300 to the travel expenses budget of the East West Committee for the travels of a delegate on the Interim Board.

 Scholarship Fund: we agree to institute, under the supervision of M & O as to guidelines, a scholarship fund to assist those who might be deterred from
- 10. Registrar's Report. We approve the recommended rates for Chico received earlier (see Minute 6 and attachment RC 6-1) subject to a return to the previous policy of a full refund for cancellations.

attending PYM without such help.

- 11. Honolulu Friends' Meeting. We hear and adopt a concern for an Interest Group on Hawaii and Hawaiian Sovereignty, which we pass on to the Social Order Committee for them to oversee such a presentation in consultation with the Friends in the Orient Committee.
- 12. Right Holding of Yearly Meeting Committee. The committee recommends that:

- 1. The Secretariat serve throughout the year.
- 2. That it furnish mailing labels as needed from a constantly updated list.
- 3. That it undertake mailings of over 20 pieces, at the request of PYM officers, using bulk mail rates.

DOCUMENTS IN ADVANCE

- 4. Committee Clerks, and others reporting to PYM, shall send a concise written report in advance (by June 15th) to the Secretariat, which will then send out a comprehensive booklet, "Documents In Advance", to go out by July 1st, to the standard PYM mailing list of meetings and officers, for consideration by Committees, meetings and those officers before Yearly meeting takes place.

 5 Any documents which miss the deadline for receipt will have to be
- 5.Any documents which miss the deadline for receipt will have to be processed at the expense of the sender or the sending committee.
- 6. Monthly Meetings and Committees should meet in July to consider Documents in Advance, and their response.
- 7. Copies of Documents in Advance should be available also to attenders at Yearly Meeting on arrival.
- 8. That a group consisting of one representative each from the RHYM Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Secretariat, with the PYM Clerk ex-officio, consider how to implement this and serve as a committee to edit the booklet.

We adopt these recommendations.

We ask the committee to consider further their recommendation for general financial assistance to attend PYM, headed "right Sharing of PYM resources" and attached RC 12-1, and bring it before our next meeting in August.

- 13. Melinda Glines ST and Karen Lawrance LJ have reported for Young Friends. They ask that our reserves for Young Friends, line item 2788 "Young Friends Travel Reserve" include support of YM YF's activity, and we agree.
- 14. The nominations brought forward in Minutes 3 and 4 are approved.
- 15. Junior Yearly Meeting Committee. We approve the name of Jim Anderson CH to serve in place of Gail Coonen HU, resigned.
- 16. Faith and Practice Committee: we agree that the Clerk of YM be on the committee ex-officio.
- 17. Finance Committee. We approve the transfer from Reserves to cover the sums of \$700, \$250 and \$300 mentioned in Minute 9 and the consequential budget reflecting these changes: RC 17-1.

- 7. Travel reserves are funds set aside for future travel costs that PYM has already agreed to pay; some groups meet every 2-3 years, but we budget a portion of the cost each year. Young Friends Travel Reserve has a cap of \$2,500 per PYM minute 92-4.
- 8. These are the only funds available for general PYM use.
- 9. Reserve Funds were returned to General Fund by Wider Fellowship Among Friends Committee per PYM minute 92-5.
- 10. Fund located in separate account. Contributions are earmarked for the specific account. Not available for general PYM use.
- 11. Reserve fund for future publications; under control of Representative Committee per PYM minute 89-4.
- 12. Loan to Friends Bulletin (\$1,649.) and Earthlight publication (\$500.); plus overdue PYM session fees (\$96.) which have since been paid.
- 13. Funds invested in "FGC Meeting House Fund" per PYM minute 90-10.
- 14. Quaker Spiritual Quest Program (South) reports a starting balance of \$481; additions of \$3420; reductions of \$361; closing balance of \$3540 on 9-30-93. After their fall conference the balance on hand was \$654. on 12-1-93.
- 15. East-West Relations Committee reports a starting balance of \$6973 on 10-1-92; additions of \$22,979; reductions of \$13,392; balance on hand of \$16,560 on 2-25-94. (\$1,223 is earmarked for the Osiyek Peace Center in Croatia.) The balance at the end of the fiscal year on 9-30-93 was \$13,699.
- 16. Unity with Nature Committee uses a fiscal year ending on June 30th for their special account. An interim report shows a balance of \$12,753 on 1-6-93; additions of \$19,331; reductions of \$19,104; leaving a balance of \$12,980 on 12-31-93.
- 17. On 11-8-93 funds for the publication of "Windows", under the care of the Friend in the Orient Committee, were transferred to a bank account handled by Salem (Oregon) Monthly Meeting in NPYM. Since that date there have been additions of \$622 and reductions of \$558; leaving a balance of \$154 on 2-22-94.

Dear PYM Committee Clerks and Officers:

This is to give you additional information regarding Representative Committee Meeting March 5th. It is also another step in preparation for the Annual Gathering Aug. 2-7, in Chico.

As indicated in earlier communications, there is a sense that at Yearly Meeting we need to devote time to focus more on the "bigger picture". This means stepping back to see the whole, and creating more opportunities for spiritual sharing and experience. Out of this spiritual centering we would seek to turn our faith into those actions that we can all support, increasing our understanding of each other's leadings, and finding more ways to support one another with our various talents and resources.

To do this means approaching each of our concerns with integrity against a backdrop of what Quakers are all about. To me this backdrop is best expressed in the evolving statement of the core of our faith and in our testimonies.

How will this work? I think there are two major ways for the Yearly Meeting to help us focus on the spiritual basis for carrying out our concerns. One is to spend more time seeking our spiritual center. This may come through spontaneous or planned sharing, in Plenaries or other sessions. It may mean that more business is conducted by the Representative Committee and that fewer issues come before Plenary.

The second path would start prior to Yearly Meeting, by each Committee preparing written materials that can be shared in advance with persons who are planning to attend the Yearly Meeting. The Ad Hoc Committee for the Right Holding of Yearly Meeting will bring a recommendation to Representative Committee that Advance Papers be sent to each Meeting. Representatives of Monthly Meetings will be asked to hold an early meeting with the persons who plan to

attend the Yearly Meeting to discuss the Advance Papers and issues that can be expected to come forth at the Yearly Meeting.

To this end I am proposing that all issues that need action and any reports that you wish to have considered in some way by the Yearly Meeting, be prepared for submission by June 15th, so they may be sent to all Monthly Meetings, (by the Secretariat). Because many of you will be holding committee meetings during the coming week, I hope you will be able to organize your work with this approach in mind.

For purposes of Representative Committee, it will be important for each committee to share their current central themes of concern and propose how they hope to bring those concerns to the yearly meeting as part of our spiritual seeking. Together, we can create Plenary sessions that address our current concerns through worship and shared ministry. God's light will surely guide us in this undertaking.

Enclosed is a very preliminary schedule of Yearly Meeting, without specific content. A critical piece of our work at the Representative Committee will be to fill that void with a vision of a spiritually dynamic Yearly Meeting.

Dear Friends:

It is with great enthusiasm that we move ahead to carry out the vision that was created at Representative Committee for our 1994 Annual Gathering, August 2 - 7, 1994, in Chico.

The enclosed Minutes from Representative Committee Meeting, with attachments, need to be read carefully.

Our vision of the 1994 Annual Gathering of Pacific Yearly Meeting is one of dipping into joy and light as together we seek our spiritual center. We want to look at the world around us from the perspective of our Quaker beliefs and testimonies. Drawing from our spiritual core, we hope to discern the truths that can guide us individually and together as seekers of peace in this time of turmoil and pain.

Three Queries were proposed for our consideration as we prepare for our Yearly Meeting:

- 1) What is our role as Quakers, among all Quakers in the world, in finding appropriate responses to the conditions of violence and despair in our world?
- 2) How can we as Quakers relate to one another and become role models to reduce tensions among ourselves and others as a means toward creating the world we yearn for?
- 3) In what ways should our Yearly Meeting provide the nurturance and caring to strengthen our spirits, that we might go forth to manifest our faith and the spirit of God through our actions?
