An unusually large number of small children is with us, making a sort of second Yearly Meeting even more lively than our own. We have all taken a hand in preparing our daily meals in cooperative fashion, which has helped us feel especially at home with one another.

We have a natural inclination to look to the future, and to fresh ways of expressing our common testimony as Friends. We are reaching westward beyond the ocean to a fellowship we dream may someday encircle the whole Pacific rim.

We have been glad to welcome Stockton, California Meeting into our membership and to listen to reports of little groups of Friends and friends of Friends which spring up like seedlings in the shadow of larger trees. We have taken considerable pride in the record of our publication, the FRIENDS BULLETIN, which does so much to unite our widely scattered membership.

We have done a good deal of searching and questioning. How can we best educate our children in the experience of religion, retaining the precious values of our Biblical literature, while adding the new insights that natural science and psychology have made available? How may we learn from and work with other world religions? How can higher education sponsored by Friends be true to our deepest concerns under today's economic pressures? The thought of the young men in prison through reasons of conscience has been much with us as we ask ourselves how each one of us can offer a peace testimony which witnesses not only through words but through our vocational and personal lives.

We have enjoyed reading your letters, and hope that any of you who find yourselves in our part of the world will visit us and our meetings.

**MINUTES OF THE THIRD ANNUAL SESSION OF PACIFIC YEARLY MEETING AND THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE PACIFIC COAST ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS
HELD IN PASADENA, CALIFORNIA — August 11 through 14, 1949**

THURSDAY, 8/11, 7:30 IN THE EVENING AT VILLA STREET MEETING HOUSE.

After a period of worship, the epistle from New Zealand General Meeting was read by the Reading Clerk. The reading of two letters from Ruby and Edward Dowsett and from John Johnson, all from New Zealand followed.

The Treasurer's report showed total receipts of \$2,703.50 and disbursements of \$2,581.72 leaving a balance on hand of \$115.78. An itemized report is attached to these minutes.*

The Clerk reported on the state of the Hiroshima Fund of which he is the Treasurer:

Contributions to this fund came from 461 individual and groups distributed over most states and Canada.

Appreciation was expressed to Villa Street Friends for the use of their meeting house.

FRIDAY, 8/12, 9:15 IN THE MORNING AT PACIFIC OAKS FRIENDS SCHOOL.

During a worship period a memorial message was given for Howard S. Fawcett of Riverside who died on December 12, 1948.

The epistles from New England Yearly Meeting, Wilmington Yearly Meeting and Baltimore Yearly Meeting (Homewood) were read in part.

The minutes of the preceding evening's session were read, amended and approved.

Stockton Meeting has applied for membership in Pacific Yearly Meeting after having become a member of College Park Quarterly Meeting. Catherine Bruner, Clerk of Stockton Meeting gave a brief description of the meeting and its activities. There are three resident Friends families and a number of students from the College of the Pacific. Regular meeting for worship is held.

The meeting approved this application for membership.

Reports were given from members of groups in fellowship with Pacific Coast Association of Friends. Those reporting are: Lydia Michener, for Pasadena Friends Meeting (Villa Street); Alice Pearson, for First Friends Church, Pasadena; Edith Sperry for the Santa Monica Worship Group; Oscar Marshburn for First Friends Church, Whittier; Leslie Spelman for the Redlands Friends Group; Lewis Langston for the Claremont Wider Quaker Fellowship Group; and Peggy Church for the group in Taos, New Mexico.

A minute from Sydney Monthly Meeting, Australia was read, introducing Margaret Wittells, a member of London Yearly Meeting and a resident of Sydney.

The Secretary read the minutes of the meeting of the Representatives Committee, held in Pasadena on August 10th and 11th, 1949. These minutes were approved by the Yearly Meeting.

Introducing a discussion of peace and service, Winifred Rawlins called for a kind of ministry like John Woolman's. Friends should not only be willing to make changes in their organizations and schedules to gain time for spreading our message within and without our society, but should also re-examine their personal living and their position in a society that inevitably leads to war.

Several Friends expressed concern regarding recent events at Earlham and William Penn Colleges indicating weakness in upholding Friends peace testimony. Others suggested that the main value we may derive from the knowledge of these situations is greater care in regard to our own activities that may make our peace testimony difficult.

A letter to the Clerk from Clarence E. Pickett, Executive Secretary of the American Friends Service Committee was read, supplementing the Committee's annual report.

In discussing these matters, some Friends felt there was a danger that Service Committee activities may become too big and, thereby superficial. The sense of the meeting appeared to be that the Friends Service Committee's activities are a valid expression of the Society's spiritual concern, and that the opportunity to serve often assists spiritual growth.

A concern for activities for teen-agers during this session of Yearly Meeting was referred to the Education Committee.

The Meeting adjourned at 12:30 P.M.

FRIDAY, 7:40 IN THE EVENING AT PACIFIC OAKS FRIENDS SCHOOL.

Following a period of worship, excerpts from epistles from Indiana and New York Yearly Meetings were read.

Helen Stevenson for the Education Committee reported that Friends educational projects were discussed in a special meeting this afternoon. The present session is to be devoted to religious education in Friends Meetings.

Discussion of programs for the nursery and elementary school age group was based on a report on the program at Orange Grove Meeting. An attempt is made to let the children have an experience appropriate to their respective levels of development. Some silence is used, but no Bible story material, and traditional religious terminology is avoided.

Some friends questioned the validity of this approach and stressed the spiritual values of Bible story material and scripture memorizing.

A desire was expressed that Friends may progress beyond these differences and discover a way of uniting the values of both positions.

Tracy Meeting is the only Meeting within the Yearly Meeting that has a high school group at the present time, though the Claremont Wider Quaker Fellowship has recently started one. There is a need for planning ahead for this age group.

In regard to the college age group, it was felt that the Friends have a great opportunity in reaching young people when they are often dissatisfied with traditional organized religion and open to an experimental religious experience. This is particularly important as many of our Monthly Meetings are located near college campuses.

Several Friends discussed the need for balance of the emotional and intellectual aspects of a religious experience.

Attention was called to the "Round the World Quaker Letters" initiated by Ruby Dowsett. These letters attempt to give Friends children all over the world a common background of religious knowledge.

The thought was also expressed that Pacific Yearly Meeting, in view of its location, has a peculiar responsibility to utilize religious material from the Orient.

A concern that Pacific Yearly Meeting invite Anna Brinton to visit among Friends on the Pacific Coast was favorably received. The Education Committee was asked to explore this project, to consider what financial responsibility Pacific Yearly Meeting may be able to assume, and to report back during this session of Yearly Meeting.

The suggestion was made that the meeting direct the Education Committee to arrange an Education Conference prior to the 1950 session of Pacific Yearly Meeting.

Adjourned at 10:00 P.M.

SATURDAY, 8/13, 9:30 IN THE MORNING AT PACIFIC OAKS FRIENDS SCHOOL.

A memorial message to George F. Howell, of Pasadena, deceased May 25, 1949 was given during the worship period preceding the business session.

A letter from the Ludwigshafen Group of Friends of the Friends was read.

Parts of the epistles from Szechwan Yearly Meeting (West China), Sweden Yearly Meeting and the three Canada Yearly Meetings held in joint session were read.

The minutes of the sessions held on August 12, were read and approved after corrections had been made.

Activities of the FRIENDS BULLETIN during the past year were discussed by Edwin Sanders, Editor and Phillip Wells, Chairman of the Bulletin Committee.

Recognition was given to the devoted service of Ruth Jensen, Ed's assistant, who will not return to her position.

The Meeting appeared to be particularly interested in Ed Sanders' description of the information obtained from persons on the Bulletin's mailing list, and its usefulness to like-minded people. Great appreciation of the editorial staff's work was expressed.

The Bulletin Committee recommended:

- 1) That the BULLETIN be continued with Ed Sanders as Editor;
- 2) That there be at least ten issues during the coming year;
- 3) That the subscription rate be at least \$1.00 a year.

These recommendations were accepted.

Robert Dann, reporting for the Friends World Committee for Consultation, discussed plans for the Friends World Conference in England in the summer of 1952. A letter from the Committee's Chairman outlining these plans is appended to these minutes.

It was suggested that we should now begin to accumulate a travel fund for sending a representative to the World Conference. We should also make it possible for our representative on the Committee to attend the Conference of its American Section in Richmond, Indiana next September.

Robert Simkin, for the Finance Committee, submitted a proposed budget for 1949-1950. After considerable discussion and modification of some items as suggested by Friends, the Meeting approved the budget as follows:

It was emphasized that Monthly Meetings alone have authority to determine their contributions to Yearly Meetings. They are encouraged, however, at an early date, to communicate with the Treasurer the amount of contribution, if any, they have decided to make. Such communications will enable the Finance Committee, if necessary to adjust the budget, before commitments are made for the Yearly Meeting.

SATURDAY, 7:45 IN THE EVENING AT PACIFIC ACKWORTH SCHOOL, TEMPLE CITY.

While the Meeting worshipped, it received memorial testimonials to Hannah Moore, Joseph Moore, Katherine Satterthwait, all of San Jose. Parts of the epistles from the Philadelphia Yearly Meetings (Arch Street and Race Street) and from North Carolina Yearly Meeting were read.

The Secretary gave a statistical report, compiled from information obtained from Monthly Meetings by direction of the Yearly Meeting.

The total membership of Pacific Yearly Meeting is 699 individuals in 300 family units. Of these members, 561 are adults. There are 380 children and young people under the care of affiliated Monthly Meetings, some of whom are recorded as members and some are not by request of their parents.

The Secretary's complete report is attached to these minutes.*

It was suggested that the Secretary write to the silent worship group in Salt Lake City, Utah, and Missoula, Montana, expressing our interest and offering our services if desired by them.

Lyra Dann gave the attached report of the Visitation Committee.†

The Committee made the following recommendations which the Meeting approved:

- 1) That travel minutes be given to Winifred Rawlins and Leslie Spelman, who are planning to visit meetings in the East and in Canada during next fall and winter.
- 2) That a message of fellowship and encouragement be sent to the men serving prison terms because of their peace testimony. Lyra Dann and Ed Sanders were appointed to write this letter.

The Clerks should write the travel minutes as requested and in addition one for Ruth Schooler

who is planning to attend Kansas Yearly Meeting.

On the Visitation Committee's request, Hannah Erskine then gave a most interesting report of her and Andrew Erskine's trip to Australia, the British Isles and Canada, during which they visited many monthly meetings and attended Australia General Meeting and London Yearly Meeting.

The Meeting appointed Robert and Margaret Simkin to write a letter to the Ludwigshafen group in reply to their greetings.

A suggestion from Robert Vogel regarding the setting up of a travel pool for delegates to Yearly Meeting was presented. If each of the sixteen member Monthly Meetings on the American mainland contributed \$25, it would be possible to pay to each of them an amount equal to two cents a mile for the round trip distance from the Bay area. This would somewhat assist the distant meetings in sending at least one delegate to Yearly Meeting next year.

The Meeting expressed general approval of a travel fund plan, and encouraged Robert Vogel to correspond with representatives of Monthly Meetings in view of setting up such a fund for the 1950 session of Yearly Meeting.

The Meeting directed the Treasurer to hold for use in 1950 an amount of \$105.00 that has been contributed recently for a travel fund by the three Southern California Meetings.

The Meeting heard a proposal from Orange Grove Monthly Meeting to the effect that the future Yearly Meeting Discipline provide for Associate Membership for children and that this type of membership be changed to active membership or terminated when the child reaches maturity.

After a stimulating discussion on the meaning of membership the matter was referred to the Monthly Meetings for consideration.

The Friends Committee on National Legislation's sixth annual report was read in part. It is attached to these minutes. Friends were encouraged to support the Committee.

The 1948 session of Yearly Meeting appointed a Special Committee on Conscientious Objectors. Winifred Rawlins, as the only member of that Committee present at this session, reported that it had been unable to function because of distance and lack of definition of its function by the Yearly Meeting. She suggested that the Committee be discharged for the time being.

The Meeting approved this suggestion, indicating that this should not be interpreted as an expression of indifference to the concern that had led to the Committee's appointment. Monthly Meetings were encouraged to look for opportunities of service in this respect.

Adjourned at 10:30 P.M.

SUNDAY, 8/14, 2:15 IN THE AFTERNOON AT PACIFIC OAKS FRIENDS SCHOOL.

After a worship period, part of the epistle of London Yearly Meeting and the epistle from Fritchley General Meeting were read.

The minutes of Saturday's session were read and approved.

The Epistle Committee proposed, and the Meeting approved the following epistle:*

Ferner Nuhn gave a report on Friends Indian activities in the Southwest.

The Meeting was advised that the Hiroshima project is to be known as "Hiroshima Day Care Center". As a beginning a building for the center and one house for the staff will be erected on land donated by the Japanese Government for a peace memorial. As way opens, other buildings will be added and the project should be considered continuous.

The suggestion was approved that a note expressing our interest in this project be attached to the copy of our epistle that is to be sent to Japan Yearly Meeting.

Vern James reported that Mrs. Manley of Santa Cruz had donated to the American Friends Service Committee her 50 acre property located near Santa Cruz. As the American Friends Service Committee is not yet incorporated in California, title of the property is being held by the College Park Association for the time being.

The property is administered by a Committee of Three; one representative from the American Friends Service Committee, Northern California Region, one representative of Pacific Yearly Meeting and one of California Yearly Meeting. Vern James has been serving as our representative pending appointment by Yearly Meeting.

The Meeting instructed the Clerk to write a letter of appreciation to Mrs. Manley.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY TO PACIFIC YEARLY MEETING
AND PACIFIC COAST ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS,
AUGUST 1949

Last year the Secretary sent out questionnaires dealing with a variety of concerns and interests, and a good deal of thinking went into the replies. This year the questionnaire as directed by the Yearly Meeting to be sent to member meetings of the Yearly Meeting, was almost entirely statistical, and a lot of hard work on the part of clerks and correspondents and others has resulted in a long list of figures. Let us note in passing that not everyone was easily pigeonholed; we are still, fortunately, so lacking in uniformity as to cause even the most conscientious fillers-in of questionnaires occasionally to qualify their answers.

We have summarized the replies received from sixteen member monthly meetings; in addition there are figures from Stockton, which are based on the number of attenders rather than the number of members and were made out before the meeting was affiliated with the Yearly Meeting.

We are not *big* in numbers. Our worship groups vary in size, two meetings reporting an average attendance of eight persons and one meeting reporting an average of sixty-five. Altogether about 355 persons attend our meetings each Sunday. Actual membership also varies, from Shanghai's six members to Orange Grove's 197. The

total membership of all the monthly meetings in the Yearly Meeting adds up to 699, of which 561 are adults. In almost every meeting there are more women than men. About 26% of the adult members are non-resident. Several meetings comment that they have in attendance persons who are members of other monthly meetings and who cannot be counted as members of our Yearly Meeting. However, of those who are members of our Yearly Meeting, 49 hold membership also in other meetings elsewhere, and we must keep in mind that three of our monthly meetings belong to other Yearly Meetings in addition to ours.

Perhaps the most important figure for us to think about is the total number of young people under the care of our meetings: up to and including college age there are 380 children and young people. Of these, 180 are of pre-school age, 136 are of elementary school age, 25 are of high school age, and 63 are of college age. It is interesting to compare the figure of 561 adult members with this total of 380 young people under our care.

Other items we can report are: associate members, 59; birthright members under 21, 67; number of family units represented in membership, 300. Additions to membership during the year total 94; of these, 42 by conviction, 32 by transfer from other monthly meetings, and 20 by birth and by request of parents. Losses in membership during the year total 29; of these, 10 by death, 14 by transfer to other monthly meetings, and 5 by release.

A very brief questionnaire was sent to certain unorganized or unaffiliated groups in the area, and replies are on hand from Claremont Wider Quaker Fellowship, Redlands Friends Group, Santa Monica Friends Group, Pasadena Monthly Meeting of Friends, meeting at Villa Street, Eugene Preparative Meeting of Friends, and Taos Friends Group. Interesting information about these groups is available and should encourage intervisitation.

REPORT OF THE FRIENDS BULLETIN COMMITTEE

The BULLETIN has been published during the past year as directed by the Yearly Meeting. The work has been done by the editor, Ed Sanders, and his assistants at Pacific Oaks and by the many contributors throughout the Yearly Meeting.

We feel that the BULLETIN has been encouragingly effective in promoting the unity of our Yearly Meeting and has also quickened the life of the Society as a whole. The response we have had from distant places encourages us in this belief. We have published 11 issues this year at a total cost of \$2,248.18. We have averaged 1200 copies per issue. Of these, 558 have been paid subscriptions. At our subscription rate of at least \$1.00, the average subscription has been \$1.77 or a total of \$1,004.50.

We recommend that Edwin Sanders should continue as editor: that the FRIENDS BULLETIN should publish at least ten issues: and that the following budget be considered:
